Crossroads. She had moved to Philadelphia from California. Having grown up around the Apostolic church, she turned away to explore other religions. Now, she said she was a Christian. She found Crossroads, enjoyed the services, and took home a baptism application. Later, she



invited her live-in fiancé. He also enjoyed the service, though he is not a Christian. It was clear that there was confusion and some sticky situations to sort out. But that's often the case with newer believers. One Sunday early in the service, she left abruptly. It was noticeable and caused some concern; perhaps she had some family issue. Later she explained on social media:

Today I walked out of church...I think I was upset that they printed this without thinking of who might be reading it idk to say "wicked hopeless traditions" about people celebrating is kind of judgmental! ... I don't feel church should ever be a place to compare one religion to another or pass judgement on how others choose to practice whatever they believe in. When I was Buddhist they'd say, "Be good, Do good!" Now that I'm Christian I find that there's little room or acceptance of people who aren't like minded when it comes to religion. Religion seems to separate people. "God is love" his love is unconditional yet people misinterpret that and create such a divide...

The paper she mentions was from our missionaries. They live in an area surrounded by idolatry. It's a reminder that evangelism begins within the visible church. Not everyone who attends worship, claims to be a Christian and seeks baptism has been born again. Jesus said, "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven." (Matt. 7:21) The guest to be "spiritual" is not the same as repentant faith that leads to salvation. We want to love our neighbors, but the pluralism of our



culture cannot infiltrate the church. We are called to be different: Don't team up with those who are unbelievers. How can righteousness be a partner with

wickedness? How can light live with darkness? What harmony can there be between Christ and
the devil? How can a believer be a partner with an unbeliever? And what union can there be
between God's temple and idols? For we are the temple of the living GodTherefore, come out
from among unbelievers, and separate yourselves from them, says the Lord. Don't touch their
filthy things, and I will welcome you. (2 Cor. 6:14-17 NLT) Please pray for this couple.
