The winter steps up our time and effort in assisting our local homeless neighbors. With



the dry yet cold conditions, the homeless experience greater risk of fires as they seek to survive. This picture shows a fire at the camp where we've been heading to for the longest. A fireman friend who has headed to this camp numerous times with me sent me this picture, which appears to show the fire destroying a structure that has housed numerous homeless individuals for a few decades. Harry, a homeless man who is thankfully now housed, had previously lived there for about 25 years himself, before passing it on to someone else. Please pray that we would have increased opportunities to minister physically and spiritually to the population of people there. The camp is currently at twenty people and it continues to increase as our city has been evicting homeless from land that is located on floodplains. Approximately 130 homeless have been forced to leave their locations over the last month.

A church located in another town reached out to us, asking if there were opportunities to serve Citylight next summer. We've been desiring to make an unrenovated portion of our building usable for quite some time, so in the summer of 2026 they will be bringing a group over to team up with us in renovating that space. I continue to be amazed at how the broader body of Christ thinks on our needs here in the city and steps in to fulfill them. I am often reminded that your prayers and ours are effective as God works in hearts.
