The facility was built for the U.S. Post Office in 1906. Later, it was home to an American Legion post. And then, the building was used to produce and sell water ice, a favorite neighborhood treat.





While that's a reasonable price to replace a church roof, it's still a significant sum for a small congregation. The church has saved some money; they continue to collect more. Some area churches have

> have a ministry to Swahili speakers. Pastor Solomon and others from the church helped the Crossroads Care Team communicate with the family, learning about some needs.

the items that were needed. The family was overjoyed by the outpouring of love.

Two Congolese women expect to deliver babies this summer. The Care Team plans to host a baby shower to help these young mothers. Please pray for this multi-generational family of seventeen.
